

Defending the Articles of Confederation Primary Source Analysis

The Articles of Confederation created a weak federal government and failed to address many needs facing our new nation. The Articles were eventually thrown out, but not all Americans shared the *perspective* that doing so was a good choice or even necessary.

In 1785, Richard Henry Lee, a wealthy and influential Virginian, spoke in defense of the Articles and said:



"I think Sir that the first maxim* of a man who loves liberty should be, never to grant to Rulers an atom of power that is not most clearly & indispensably necessary for the safety and well being of Society ... [T]he Confederation should not be presumptuously called an infallible* system for all times and all situations ... no change should be admitted until proved to be necessary by the fairest, fullest & most mature experience."
